Massimo's form hard to ignore

MIDFIELDER Massimo Luongo looks set to be rewarded for last week's role as an impact player with a start against Japan in tomorrow's World Cup qualifier.

The 2015 Asian Cup player of the tournament has started the past two qualifiers, both in the Middle East, on the bench as Ange Postecoglou struggles to fit in all of his in-form midfielders.

More than 45,000 fans are expected at Etihad Stadium, where the roof could be closed because of rain.

Luongo scored and impressed in his last start, the 2-0 win over Iraq in Perth a month ago, and Postecoglou praised his QPR and Socceroos form.

"We're really strong (in midfield)," Postecoglou said. "Mass was unlucky not to start the other night. When he came on again, as in the UAE, he really drove us forward.

"He's flying. I've watched QPR the last couple of weeks



and he's really going well and he's another that can score.

"He scored against Iraq, from midfield areas he gets into good positions.

"We've got some good depth. We've got Jackson (Irvine), he looks like every camp he comes in stronger and this camp he looks even more confident and stronger than last.

"Again a midfielder who can score goals. They are the underlying things we're looking at that for us is getting pretty exciting. We're going to have some real strong options in those areas.'

Postecoglou hasn't decided on his XI but the Socceroos yesterday conducted a review of the 2-2 draw with Saudi Arabia.

While there are no injury concerns, Postecoglou said there would be new faces.

There won't be a lot of changes but we'll make at least a couple because we've got an opportunity to do that because we've got some players in the squad who didn't play in the first game and have got a bit of energy about them," he said.



Roo star Mooy also a huge hit with Huddersfield fans

THE Aaron Mooy project is one of the most intriguing experiments in Australian sport.

Owned by the world's richest football firm City Football Group, which is bankrolled by Sheikh Mansour from Abu Dhabi's ruling family, Mooy has been loaned to an unfashionable English second-tier club.

Yet Huddersfield Town, the birthplace of rugby league, is defying the odds and topping the English Championship.

Mooy, as his August nomination for the league playerof-the-month award indicates, has been vital.

His loan move was viewed cynically in Australia after Luke Brattan's identical journey backfired last season. But his deft touch and extraordinary game awareness led to at least 12 offers from four European leagues, including Belgians Club Brugge.

At 26, Mooy is no kid. But his sudden impact at Huddersfield Town suggests he will be ready for the next challenge.

Mooy signed a three-year deal with Man City, who bought him from Melbourne City and loaned him to the Terriers for a season with a view to eventually selling him.

A question that seemed implausible three months ago is now being asked. Is Manchester City boss Pep Guardiola watching Mooy?

The midfielder reluctantly broaches the Sky Blues subject, not for a lack of confidence but rather a fear of beyond "project Huddersfield 2016-17".

"The plan was to give me an opportunity to play in Europe and see how good I can become." Mooy said.

"I'm proud of myself. If one day Î was to play for Man City, I'd be happy and proud.

"I'll just take it one season at a time and see how far I can go. I'm not putting pressure on myself to do that, I'm just trying to become the best I can be.

"They (CFG) helped a lot level," van 't Schip said.

"It feels good to be with (CFG), feels like I'm still part of Melbourne City."

Winning promotion with Huddersfield, who are managed by Liverpool boss Jurgen Klopp's best mate David Wagner, is the goal but Mooy is reluctant to dream.

Terriers fans have fallen in love with their new No.10, who's style has been likened to Zinedine Zidane.

"I've been surprised, I didn't know if they would like my style, but they seem to enjoy it. Hopefully they like me at the end of the season," Mooy said.

"I didn't know what to expect, it's still only 11 games in. Everyone's talking like it's the end of the season, I'm not getting carried away.

There was a variety of (offers). Huddersfield was a good fit, I met the manager (Wagner) and his highpressing, possession style was similar to the Socceroos and has worked well for me.

"There's competition so I need to play well to keep my spot. It's good, puts pressure on me to perform. I always believe in myself.

'That (promotion) would be a fairytale. It's good to be at the top, it's still early."

Mooy's agent Paddy Dominguez expects him to play in the Premier League in 2017.

"He's following a plan," he said. "The purpose of playing for Huddersfield was to prepare him for the Premier League next season and by then I expect he'll be 100 per cent ready.

Melbourne City foresaw his emergence, quadrupling his salary cap wage to a coveted \$1 million-a-year plus a marquee slot in 2015-16, when he went on to score 11 and assist 21 times.
